


Several opportunities will be available every month to join friends and meet other members at our planned day and overnight rides, as well as planned events; this is where lifelong relationships are created.

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Riding the Delcon Detour

Every great ride starts with a story. Many years ago the Orange Coast chapter was preparing to take a ride to Arizona. Wanting to make the most of the ride they planned a slight detour on the first night at the biker gathering in Laughlin Nevada. The original ride planners kept seeing posters for Laughlin and noticed the event sponsor was "Dalcon Productions". When maps were finally posted a slight typo changed it to Delcon. A epic ride and event was had by all and suddenly a tradition was born. The Delcon Detour.

Chapter over night trips, or "overnighters" as they are affectionately called, are special. Spending days on the road life finds its own pace. Early starts, great roads, scenery, and the camaraderie of shared experience and adventure make these the most popular and memorable of our chapter events. Overnighters come in various sizes, from one night weekend rides to week long five or six night rides. Obviously the longer the ride the greater the commitment required to attend. Time off work, family commitments and money all mean that to attend you must fully invest in the ride. The bar is high for many of us but once riders make the leap they never regret it.

As chapter member Ginny Cook told us, "Jim has ridden motorcycles for over 50 years but has never made any long trips.....Work commitments limited us to overnights last year, but we planned to make longer trips in 2019. "

Her husband Jim continued, "We felt Delcon was a good first long trip because the daily mileages were similar to the longer chapter day rides and because we would spend two nights in the same hotel. And Ginny likes the security of traveling with the chapter, knowing that a Road Captain is just minutes away if anything untoward happens."

The Route

The Delcon Detour is a four night, five day 1,200 mile excursion along old route 66 through south eastern California and north western Arizona. Starting in Anaheim we trace this historic road past Palm Springs and north to Laughlin. A single night stay and then the next morning it's on to Williams which becomes home base for two nights as we tour the Grand Canyon. The follow up is even better as we make our way down through Sedona and the mountain top mining town of Jerome, to our final night in Wickenburg.

It's a grand historic tour. Only schedule every 3-4 years it is one of the more highly anticipated and attended rides on the chapter calendar.

Day One - Laughlin NV

The morning meeting place has the atmosphere of a reunion as we arrive and see who will be our travelling companions over the next five days. The early start is a tradition as we want to arrive with enough time left in the day to enjoy Laughlin.

Our route will take us out the 91 to the 10 where we will stop and have breakfast in Banning. Once in Palm Springs we leave the freeway and head north, past Joshua Tree to 29 Palms and then north on Kelbaker road to Amboy. Once a major stop on the old Route 66 it is now a tourist destination and a favorite of the chapter, with photo opportunities with the giant painted 66 on the road.



Once the photo shoot was over it was a quick ride up to the Saharra Oasis. The only gas stop on the way to Laughlin, almost all bikes stop for at least a stretch break. Gas is over \$5 a gallon so only the small tanks fill up. A bbq in the parking lot has long lines but the burgers and hot dogs are good. Soon we are on our way and descending down to the river town of Laughlin. Built on the Colorado river and in the bottom most corner of Nevada this thin sliver of land has legalized gambling and river side casinos.

Many stories could be told of H.O.G. member adventures in Laughlin.... But what happens on the road, stays on the road!



Day Two - Williams AZ

Crossing the border in Arizona we get the benefit of cheaper gas prices. Heading up into the hills it is a quick ride to Oatman, home of the roaming donkeys. An historic mining town Oatman was part of Route 66 and famously hosted Clark Gable and Carole Lombard on their honeymoon. Filled with bikers here for the River Run the chapter makes a brief stop and then heads north through the twisties to Kingman and on to Seligman. A brief rain shower forces a much enjoyed ice cream stop and then we are back on the road to Williams.

Arriving in each destination it isn't long before in ones, and two's the group all comes together to socialize and re-live the day's events. Some of the best times on the road are had during these times where we relax and just enjoy the moment.

Day Three - The Grand Canyon

It is sometimes surprising how many of us from Southern California haven't been to the Grand Canyon.

I have lived in Southern California most of my adult life and had yet to visit the Grand Canyon. What a majestic sight! I went with the Chapter to Utah last year and we visited some national parks with saw their amazing natural beauty, but they seemed small compared to "The Grand - Canyon". Mike Norton

The highlight of day three is the ride to the canyon itself. Hard to describe and certainly words don't do it justice. We are all in awe of just the natural wonder of the world we live in - this is why we ride.

The morning ride from Williams to the park is a bit chilly in the thin air of the high desert. The landscape is flat and it is hard to imagine the natural wonder that lies ahead. An early start means that we beat the traffic to the park entrance. Nothing can be more miserable than sitting in a traffic jam and walking your bike up to pay the entrance fee to get into a park.

Once through it is a short ride to the south rim. Coming through the trees the canyon opens up in front of you. Words just don't do it justice. In some places brave or maybe foolish souls go right up to the edge to get that all important selfie. A ranger tells us that someone fell off just the other day.

Soon we are off again, east on the park road that follows the south rim. The tree lined road is smooth and cuts in and out of the forest. An occasional glimpse of the canyon cuts through the trees. At the eastern end is the Desert View Watch Tower. Definitely worth the stop, inside is a museum of local Native American art and as you climb up the narrow winding staircase the views get better and better.

Hungry after all the sightseeing we head straight for a landmark, The Cameron Trading Post. A Navajo reservation favorite the local fry bread or the chili seem to be most popular. The store has lots to choose from and it is a great finishing touch to a great day. Afternoon rain clouds chase us back to Williams where we share another evening of telling stories and enjoying music and dancing in the local hotel restaurant.

Day Four - Jerome/Wickenburg

The variety of scenery is what makes this area so special. Route 89A south from Flagstaff and through Sedona doesn't disappoint as we make our way down red rock canyons and through green pine forests. The morning air has a slight chill but it warms as we make our way to the lower elevations.

A quick stop in Sedona for some shopping and then we are off to our lunch stop and a highlight of the trip. Jerome is a small mining town, built atop a mountain - and is quite a tourist destination. The backdrop to all the shops and restaurants is the incredible views of the desert valley below. This stop is a chapter favorite and we plan extra time to enjoy the sights.

Soon we continue on towards Prescott through beautiful winding desert roads. We are coming down to the desert floor now and the heat creeps up as we descend. The pool at our hotel in Wickenberg is a welcome sight. True to form our last night is a night-in and we order pizza, sit by the pool and just enjoy the moment.

Day Five - Heading Home

Unfortunately every trip has an end. Our final ride out of Wickenberg is on a section of old Route 66 and that seems like a fitting way for this journey to close. The last 300 miles are more a workman like effort as we pound them out on I—10. Work, chores, and daily responsibilities wait for us all, and every mile we can feel them getting closer and closer.





Revisited: The Three Rivers Experience

Day 1


I'm sitting here plotting my next escape from work (Newcomb Ranch Ride) and remembered I 'volunteered' to write the ride article for the last 3 Rivers Ride earlier this month! **D'oh!** My apologies Editor for being late. So, if memory serves me correctly (and it usually doesn't any longer......

40+bikes and 50+ riders gathered under gray skies at Jerome's parking lot Friday morning May 31st for a 7:00AM departure. Always terrific to see some "old faces" as well as new faces on these overnighters.

"91-57-210-5-HIKE"......as well as CA Highways 99 & 58 to the Kern River....finally 160 miles later. But, at least the sun is out now.



We're surrounded by fruit and nut trees in the valley's & hillsides before we turn up the Kern River. The river is a gushing, roaring, flow of brown, green, 'white water' rapids like I've not seen before. But no worries....we'll keep the shiny side up and dry, thank you.



We stop at the Pizza Barn (where, I don't know)...for lunch. Afterwards, we carve up a canyon for 60 miles of riding along the Kern River through a semi-arid mix of scrub and water. Fairly warm...but that's great after such a long, gray May. We've now climbed up in elevation to nearly 5000 feet & are surrounded by pine and sequoia trees. The temperature has dropped to 70F which just feels great after being in the canyon. As we cross Great Western Divide Highway we're at 6500' and a nice 61F! Just being on the 'other side' of the divide can make a difference! Highway 190 is actually a well paved road now with 30 miles of twisties & switchbacks. DY-NO-MITE! CAUTION: I don't know if you can retrace this route with the supplied GPS Infotainment maps. I am using the supplied PDF map and Google-Maps now at 400% zoom to find the names of these roads! Further, I don't recall ever seeing a road sign up there. We eventually find our way to the Comfort Inn & Suites in Three Rivers to end a terrific day of riding.

Day 2

8:15 Pre-Ride Instructions.

"Only 168 miles today,
folks"....."Gee, what are we
going to do after that?", I asked
myself. "Well, we are picking
up pre-made subs @ Subway
so, another leisurely paced
lunch, I guess".... What I didn't
realize was that this route was
brought to us by past Director

Carlos....known for his fondness of twisties.....60 miles of them to start the day! This little pig cried WHEEEEE all the way home! More than one of our well-traveled riders commented that this route (CA's 216, 245, 364, 245 again, & 180) to Sequoia National Forest was more fun (more turns) than the famed Dragon's Tail. I know it has to have more than The Devil's Highway AZ666......

After visiting the General Grant Tree we were on our way down from 6000' to Grizzly Falls picnic area to enjoy those subs. We were riding 25 miles of , you guessed-it, twisty-turns turns with sweeping vistas of the surround (still snow-capped) mountains. This was my first time through this part of the park. I was surprised to learn there were several other first timers in this portion of the Park. What an AWESOME ride that was. Beautiful, breathtaking, magnificent, wondrous, striking were just a few of the words I heard as we enjoyed our subs while relaxing in the mist of a ROARING Grizzly Falls just behind us. On the other side of the road was the south fork of the Kings River. Jade colors rolling over the giant boulders. Just couldn't be better. Sunny, cool, water.

OK. We're half way through our 168-mile ride....the only way out is the way we came in! TERRIFIC! Twice the bang for the buck! We stopped at one of the vista's, 100's of feet above the canyon for a group OCHOG photo or two (top). We're back at Grant's Tree area and now heading to the "other" side of the mountain. It's only a few more miles to the next gas stop. It's beautiful outside, sun is shining, terrific temperature.....





"What? Me Worry"? Quickly, the weather on the "other side" of the mountain began to cool, change, drizzle, rain?! The temperature began to drop (55F now!). I'm just in a t-shirt, but so is Eric in front of me and the lady behind me, so I CAN'T stop to put on a jacket. But, we all make it, a little colder but still with our pride.

We didn't spend too much time in this winter wonderland and got on down the road (skipping General Sherman's Tree) to the warmer climes of Three Rivers, craft beer & comfort food.

Day 3

I anticipated that this would be another "slabber-day", just bomb down CA99 from Fresno to get home early (correct, I did not digest my maps the night before to see that we will, as we always

do, take the road-less-traveled to home). All-in-all a 277mile ride back. Some of the highlights (other than the U-turns due to computerized navigation issues) were Old Stage Road, Jack Ranch Road & Granite Road. How do our Road Captains/Planners find such trails.....literally, I think we were riding the original stage route with no improvements. We popped out of massive rolling hills, covered with huge 100-year-old oak trees into the oil patch of Bakersfield and Jack-In-The-Box....ah, civilization? 80 more miles to the Chevron in Santa Clarita, say our "good-byes" to the remaining riders (only 12 of us now?) and on to home via "The Orange County Split". All told 768 miles and a MILLION SMILES along the way!



The Road Warrior: Bodfish - Breckenridge Loop

I was totally bummed. The chapter was off on a three day overnighter to Three Rivers. Unfortunately commitments kept me from going, however I did have a full day Saturday where I could ride. Now, where to go...


Looking at Google maps I noticed a blue line where I have not seen one between Caliente Bodfish to Hwy 178. "What's this? A previously undiscovered road?" Upon closer inspection it was more of a paved path than an actual road. On Butler maps they call them paved mountain trails. "Well that looks like a great route", I thought to myself.

I pinged my good friend and fellow road warrior Mike, who was also unable to go on the overnighter. He was in. The plan was a freeway blast up over the Grapevine, north through the town of Arvin, past the new Veterans Cemetery, turn off on Bodfish Caliente then take the loop on Caliente Creek road, Connect back to Bodfish Caliente and up to this new road called Breckenridge.

We met at the Chevron at the corner of Harbor Blvd. and Gisler Dr. in Costa Mesa. Kick Stands Up was 5:30 AM. I have to admit it, I started feeling cold heading up the grapevine. Thankfully it warmed up as we hit the plateau in the Pyramid Lake area. By the time we got to the T/A truck stop on Laval Road the temperature had kicked up at least 5° or so and I was doing okay. When I told Mike I was getting a little cold he just smiled and opened up his leather jacket revealing a heated jacket underneath.

A straight shot north then a straight shot east on Hwy 223 and finally we get our first curves. The road gracefully rises from Arvin and arcs past the new Bakersfield Veterans Cemetery where it connects to Highway 58. We turn right and then a quick left on Bealeville road which becomes Caliente Bodfish road

Caliente Bodfish is a legendary with crazy tight switch-backs and steep cliffs. No guard rails are in sight. It then meanders through a series of Meadows and Fields before getting a bit twisty again as it descends into the Lake Isabella area. I have found several excuses to ride this road but often wondered what else was up here. I was about to find out.





Instead of staying on Caliente Bodfish up the crazy switch-backs we turn right on Caliente Creek road. What a pleasant surprise! No, it didn't have crazy turns and cliff edge heart pounding vistas, but it was one of the most scenic canyons I've ridden through. As the name implies it parallels Caliente Creek which winds its way down the local hills and mountains. This is a free range area and we saw a lot more cows on the roadway than cars. There was also a couple of spots where the creek had to cut new channels across the road. Fortunately, they were only a few inches deep and we pressed on.

At the little town of Twin Oaks, the road veers more north and straightens out to be more windy than twisty. When we get to the Walker Basin area we start heading back west . This is where we pick up Caliente Bodfish again and take it north to Breckenridge road. I use the term 'road' very generously. It looks more like a wide asphalt sidewalk and I'm thinking I'm glad I'm on a motorcycle because maybe a car coming the other way could squeeze by. After posing at the sign for a few photos Mike and I headed up the road.

We ease our way around blind turn after blind turn that were probably wide enough for two vehicles to pass each other, fortunately we never had to put that to the test as we didn't see another car going in either direction. Despite what the sign said, the road was not closed for the winter and we were able to continue all the way up. Close to the top we pulled off and enjoyed this spectacular view.

After a quick break we continued on towards the top of the mountain at close to 7000 feet. We entered a pine forest with all the smells and scenery and pinecones covering the road that entails. There are a few campgrounds up here and we finally saw some other cars and motorcycles. It looked like most people came up from the Bakersfield area. Probably because they knew better than to drive up the road that we did.

Finally we started the slow curvy descent. The Alpine Forest gave way to different kinds of trees and eventually became the rolling grassy hills we are so familiar with in Central California.

The road also widened, which was nice as we did have an occasional vehicle heading the other way. We continued to roll downhill with scenic vistas around every bend of the road. 30 miles after making the left on to Breckenridge Rd. and spending over an hour meandering up one side of the mountain and then down the other, we hit our first cross street and we turned towards Bakersfield.

A quick stop for lunch at the deli at Rio Bravo Ranch where we saw lots of people getting ready to go rafting down the Kern River. This place is a staging area and buses pick up groups of people. There was a big group for a birthday party having lunch and getting ready to board when we arrived.

We both checked in with our significant others and although we had contemplated taking a long scenic way home we decided to just take the straight shot through Bakersfield, down Highway 99 and back up and over the grapevine to home.

All told we covered 393 miles in about nine hours. We rode through beautiful winding canyons with water and cows and we rode are crazy mountain pass road up one side of the mountain and down the other. I think I'd call that a good day.






Looking in the rear view:

The History of OC HOG Part III

Ken and I joined the HOG group in 1995. We felt totally welcome from the start. As Chuck Murphy, our Assistant Director always said, "We're not just riding motorcycles, we're building a family." Bert [Former Director Burt Wehr] and Chuck were great ambassadors for the club. A wonderful senior member who was our Safety Officer, Norm Dubois, came up with our motto at the time, "Ride Friendly."

A significant number of our members during this period were brand new riders. Dressers were not the dominant models then as they are today. Also, there were very few women riders in the club. We "girls" took some flak from male riders on occasion.

In the early years almost all day rides were on Sunday. Officers said members did chores on Saturdays and were ready to ride Sundays. Ken and I promoted the idea of Saturday rides and were told to plan and lead some as an experiment, but that people probably wouldn't like it. Well, we did just that. Surprise, surprise! We had great participation which was challenging for us new riders not used to leading Harley riders! Among our jaunts were Rt. 66 Museum in Victorville, Reagan Presidential Library in Simi Valley and the Birch Aquarium at Scripps in La Jolla. By the way, as teachers at the time, we did subject riders to our "lectures." It was fun. From then on, Saturday was more often for Dealer/Rides and Sunday for church/family.

By then our club had become very active. In 1998 we had 17 members ride to the 95th Anniversary of Harley-Davidson in Milwaukee, WI. This was also the 15th Anniversary of HOG. Four hundred sixty-three chapters were represented including Orange Coast. Director Bert carried our club flag in the street parade.

From mid 1998 to 2002, Tom Diebolt served as our director. Tom was very much hands on. He led most of our rides. His cabinet consisted of Assistant Director Jay Wodarck, Secretry Kaye Cochran, and Treasurer Linnea Ruehl. In those days, we also had a designated chaplain as one of our discretionary officers.

In mid 2002, Ken Cochran took over as our Director. Assist. Director was our own Roger Allen. Future Directors Carlos DeFalla and Kim Stoldt/Kohlenberger came on board in discretionary positions: Activities Officer and Historian. Here are Ken's own words regarding his tenure as Director:

"We implemented the no drinking policy during all rides. Rider safety was a huge priority due to the number of bikes on our rides. We constantly promoted the dealership as they did us.

When I became Director, we had about 350 members. When I left, we were just under 700. It is estimated we generally got just over 10% participation on most rides.

Best rides? Wow, we had some great ones. My favorites were the Dal-Con and the summer cruises. Funny story - when Kimmie joined the officers' group, we were talking about setting up the summer cruise. She thought for quite awhile that it was a boat ride! In the summer, the monthly dinner rides to a surprise location were very popular. We also developed the monthly New Member ride. The CHOC ride became a very big deal. My last year leading the ride we stopped counting bikes at 1400! We donated nearly \$300,000 in toys that year! There was terrific membership participation in this event.

I think we improved the Chapter meeting experience. We were getting nearly 150-200 people at our gatherings which were held at the old Santa Ana Elk's Club. The Christmas Party was a huge event and grew year after year, taking place at either the Elk's or the Phoenix Club. My administration also invented the coveted Eagle Feather recognition program. My goal when I became Director was to improve the Chapter/Dealer relationship. We put in place activities to value and make new members feel welcome and part of the group " (Ken left in 2004 to become Director of the new Capistrano HOG chapter at OCHD's sister store.)



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
