

Sam Proko

For the 'Member of the Quarter' feature, we like to choose someone who has been instrumental to the success of our chapter in a way that is obvious and notable. Through the writing of this article, we can not only get to know this member a little better, but we can also thank them for all that they do. This quarter we chose Sam Proko. He has served tirelessly, behind the scenes, in order to keep our chapter afloat, so to speak. What



would any good organization do without their treasurer, (or as we like to call him, The Accountant). Well, thanks to Sam's adept handling of our chapter's funds, we can rest assured that there is enough money at the end of the day to keep us in the black! And in sitting with him for this interview, I learned about the path that has led Sam here, and it is fascinating!

Sam grew up in Anaheim where he was given a lot of freedom. As a kid, he liked to build mini bikes and go carts, I guess you could say that his fascination with moving vehicles started early. At age 14 he started working and saving his money, and at 15 ½ he bought a brand new 1974 Yamaha 250 Enduro. He love the feeling of being able to ride by himself, not having to rely on his parents. The Enduro was a cross between a street bike and a dirt bike. He rode that bike everywhere. Back then there was no helmet law, and at 16 he was in a bad motorcycle accident where he ended up in the hospital hurt pretty bad with a broken leg requiring two plates and 13 screws. But even that didn't dissuade him from riding, he was just a little more careful. During that time he was a photographer for a motorcycle magazine called "Crash and Burn" (maybe that hit a little too close to home right then). Some people might have given up the motorcycle life altogether, but if riding is in your blood....

One of his first jobs was working at McDonald's where he met his first wife. Her dad owned a Bob's Big Boy restaurant up in the bay area, so Sam moved up there where they opened a total of five restaurants. At age 23, he was a general manager with 80 employees under him. It was at Bob's that he met his second wife and the love of his life, Leslie. He worked that job until he got burned out and decided to go back to school and get a degree, in you guessed it- Accounting. He attended Fullerton College, working on his AA degree, while working at a large commercial printer in Los Alamitos with his mom. His achievement at Fullerton led to an academic scholarship to USC and graduated with his Bachelor of Science which set him on the next path of his career as an accountant.

After graduating, he was hired at Deloitte, one of the top accounting firms in the country. In case you don't know about them, here is a little impressive info- "Deloitte is the <u>largest</u> professional services organization in the United States. With more than 100,000 professionals, Deloitte provides audit and assurance, tax, consulting, and risk and financial advisory services to a broad cross-section of the largest corporations and governmental agencies." At this firm, Sam became a manager and did a lot of traveling. Side note- one of his clients was J&P Cycles in Anamosa, Iowa, where a huge Harley-Davidson museum is. (The H-D brand was getting into his head).

Deloitte is a hard company to work for, long hours and lots of stress. Sam eventually left that job and became the Regional Controller for Troon Golf Company, a golf management company with over 150 golf courses (a dream job if you're a golfer!) He moved to Scottsdale and got to travel all over, and as a perk, he has gotten to golf at some of the most beautiful courses in the country. Side note- he started smoking cigars at that job, because "that is what most golfers do."

After being on the road so much with that job, he got lonely and wanted to come back home and just be in one place. So he moved back to California and took a job at Balboa Insurance in their Risk Management department. At the time, his office was across from the bowling alley where our chapter used to have their meetings. (Enter Harley-Davidson again.)

Sam bought his first Harley in 2011 to ride with Leslie's brother. It was a 2002 pearl white Road King Classic. He rode it back and forth to work. Because our meeting place was so close to his work, he decided to check out a Harley chapter meeting, and he joined our chapter in 2013. His first impression was that everyone was so welcoming, inviting and humble. He remembers meeting Paul and Carolynne Schley and was impressed with their warmth and friendliness.

Right away, he decided to try to do every ride and overnighter the chapter offered, so he went on the New Member ride, went to Big Bear and SLO. After that he was "just plain hooked"! His advice to newcomers is to 'put yourself out there, get involved, make yourself at home'. The more you do with the chapter, the more you will get to know people who have the same interests as you, and the more fun you will have!

Always believing in service, and to give back to the chapter who had given him so much, he had a strong desire to help in some way and possibly join the leadership team. He volunteered his services to then Director Steve Burke, as a photographer (remember his gig at the mag "Crash and Burn?), but nothing came of that. Shortly after that Craig Shelby became director and recruited Sam for Treasurer (of course!) and with so much accounting experience this was fitting! He has been keeping our chapter financially stable for the better part of a decade! 

The Harley-Davidson Ride Planner: Downloading & Importing Ride Maps

The choice to take the road less traveled is one of independence and freedom. It's been said that the best way to really clear the mind is to just get on a bike and ride. Not knowing your destination can often be the most freeing and soul-cleansing experience. However, there are times when you'd like that 'born free' feeling without the worry of where the gas stations are or if you'll get back in time for dinner. That's where digital apps come in to play. Nowadays, technology has become so useful that even the quintessential tough biker can't help but glance at their phone or infotainment system once or twice while on a ride. Between apps that



allow you to map out your ride, to apps that record your favorite jaunt through the twisties, there's always a little room for planning and organization.

Being part of a wonderful community like Harley-Davidson has its advantages outside of the brotherhood and sisterhood we all enjoy as Chapter members. They put a lot of money and effort into R&D. They've developed ways to plan out or record your rides that are nice and easy. If you don't have an infotainment system on your bike, you can simply use your mobile phone. One of the most popular ways for Harley riders to plan out a day ride or a weekend trip is with the Harley-Davidson Ride Planner.

The Harley-Davidson Ride Planner can be used from a desktop computer or right there on your phone or tablet. You'll need to login with your active Harley-Davidson account, which can be found at https://maps.harley-davidson.com. This will keep all your rides and profile information synced across your devices. Next, you'll want to download the mobile app from the App Store or Google Play. This will allow you to access all the information from anywhere with cell reception.



No infotainment system – no problem. You can run the app from your mobile phone while on the ride. One caveat to the mobile app is that it can use a lot of power while in play so it's best to have a lead run from your battery for a full-time charge while in use on a ride, if possible.

Within the H-D Ride Planner and App you'll find locally "Recommended Rides" from Dealers as well as National HOG-promoted rides in the area.

Download "How to Import GPX file to H-D Mobile App" now by scanning the QR code (right) to view and download the step by step process. Although this demonstration is with an iPhone, a similar process can be achieved on an Android. I'd love to hear your thoughts on how well it worked, or how I can improve the process tutorial. Stay tuned for more helpful tips and tricks for a variety of topics!

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Spotlight: Dappy & Harriet's

On September 1st, 1946 in the Mojave Desert, a small oasis of the old west had its groundbreaking ceremony, and Pioneertown was born. Many television shows have been filmed in Pioneertown, from 'Roy Rogers', 'The Cisco Kid', 'Alan Lane', and many others. It is an amazing place to visit and a great ride. One of the biggest attractions is Pappy and Harriet's Pioneertown Palace an old fashion saloon and eatery famous for its location (and good food). Although many HOGsters have made the trek to Pappy and Harriet's, it was the first time the chapter rode together to this fine establishment.

The riders met up at the Sendero Marketplace and headed off over the Ortega Highway. It was foggy and wet going up in elevation and stayed that way almost all the way to Lake Perris. I really don't like riding or driving in fog but as always, I was ahead of the group hoping to get some shots of them, but that was out of the question because of the conditions. After clearing Lake Perris, the skies cleared and we could see again. With a short run up Interstate 10 and hitting the cutoff for 29 Palms and Yucca Valley, we made our last leg to the destination. The ride up the hill on Pioneertown Road is a little test of twisting and turning to keep you awake. I pulled off the road and climbed up to the top of a hill waiting for the group of riders to show. It was a bit warm so it was time to get rid of some excess layers. It is kind of

different to sit up among the rocks and cactus waiting for the riders to show up. I read 'War and Peace', unloaded two magazines shooting at targets, talked to the birds and a cheeky hawk that kept circling me, maybe it was a vulture (not sure of that).











After half an hour, I was seeing things in the desert, and heard the rumble of the pack coming down the road. Thinking to myself that I was in the perfect place to catch all of the bikes coming up the road in one shot, it was disappointing to see only three riders. It was only John, Rick, and Thomas coming down the road. I waited another ten minutes for the pack but they were nowhere to be seen. Now, knowing that sometimes I take a wrong turn here and there, I wasn't sure if they were already at Pappy and Harriet's. As I slipped and slid down the hill back to my bike, cursing all the way, I headed up to the restaurant. There was no one there but the four of us and about another 10 minutes passed before the rest of the crew came in.

Lunch was pretty darn good (I can vouch for the chili and the chicken sandwich). It is a great place to hang out, the staff was fantastic and I did not hear many complaints except from Cowboy who was stuck at a table listening to the same old stories. After lunch was finished, it was time to head for home through the Lucerne Valley and more desert riding. There are some great sights along the way, again riding solo to set up for shots, I get the freedom to ride just a bit faster and look for good vantage spots to shoot from. I decided that the Bear Valley Road turnoff would be the best place with the sun behind me and more on the riders as they slowed to make the turn. Some of the pictures came out really nice! (Remember an 11x14 is only \$15 with \$5 of that going to Warrior Foundation).

The riders all made it past me in good shape and it was time to ride off into the sunset and head for home. The group was making good time as they always do on the home stretch, so I passed them as they pulled in for gas and headed for the ranch with the thoughts of Roy Rogers singing-

"Happy trails to you, Until we meet again. Happy trails to you, Keep smiling until then."








New Beginnings—2022: Richie's Breakfast Ride

After spending most of year riding with each other week in and week out, the holiday break is refreshing, but over those couple of weeks we start to miss the activities, the rides, our friends and our HOG family members. The first ride of each year is a reunion. It represents the start of the new riding season but more than that it is coming back and seeing the familiar faces and catching up with all those that will be spending time of the road with us during the new year.

When planning chapter rides we always want to try and make it a nice first step in a very active year. We want to make it a shorter ride, to attract a broader group of chapter members, and the destination generally is a classic place that we have gone to for years. This year we chose Flo's diner at the Chino Hills Airport. Flo's is a great little diner and our chapter has gone there for years. Even better the route there takes us through Carbon Canyon, which is a great scenic ride. It was a great way to start the year and so arrangements were made, the calendar was published and we all looked forward to a great start to the year.

It was a great plan, and then the realities of living in California in 2022 struck. A few days before the ride we called to confirm that the restaurant was ready for a bunch of hungry bikers to arrive. Instead of the normal manager we reached a voicemail which informed us that the restaurant would be closed, "due to staffing shortages", through the weekend. The riding season of 2022 hadn't even started and we already had our first challenge. The Orange Coast planning committee shifted into overdrive. We scoured the local area and lined up restaurants to call. The challenge was simple. We needed a restaurant that could accommodate a group of 40-50 bikers that arrive at the same time, want quick service and require separate checks. Things were looking pretty grim when we struck gold. Richie's Diner, under the shadow of Mt. Baldy on the old route 66, didn't entirely shut us down.

They were willing to try and just asked for our patience since they had the now familiar issue of being "short staffed". We promised patience and the plans were made. New maps were made and the word of the change was sent out.

Saturday January 9th arrived and it was a beautiful day. Southern California has its issues but there are days, especially in the winter months, where one doesn't wonder why they live here. The sky was cloudless and while a bit chilly in the morning, it looked like we would reach the mid 60's later in the day. I firmly believe that chapter members vote with their time. If they are excited about events and the chapter, then they will turn out in force. Therefore I always wonder what the turnout will be before each ride. Especially so, on the first ride of the year. As I rode to the meet up site, questions ran through my head. Were people getting past Covid? Were old friends going to rejoin us? How was the spirit and excitement of the chapter?

I shouldn't have worried. I arrived an hour early to the meeting location and already there was a big collection of bikes lined up and ready to go. I was also excited to see, as I pulled up, many faces that hadn't been around for the last year or so during Covid. It seemed that we had finally turned a corner and people were finally ready to come back out. The bikes kept arriving and by departure time we headed up Tustin Blvd with 44 bikes in the train.





The morning mist was still burning off as we snaked through Carbon Canyon. A familiar ride, we typically only go through it a couple of times a year, so we reacquainted ourselves with the scenery and the road. Richie's was a little further north than our old route and so we took a new turn on Chino Hills Parkway. Going around a couple of hills, we were rewarded with the view opening up to the mountains across the valley. It was spectacular and the highlight of a great ride. It was an energized and excited group of riders that pulled in to Richie's. The staff were great, they took very good care of us. The food was excellent and it came out quick. However, the best part was catching up and talking with friends. I noticed other customers, sitting on the other side of the restaurant, looking our way. They couldn't help but notice the laughing, joking and smiling from across the room. We are a jovial group and tend to smile more, laugh harder and have more fun than most in any room.



Ride365: 2021 is in the Books

In 2018, Harley-Davidson and H.O.G. came up with the chapter challenge. This was a chapter competition to see who rode the most miles. Two categories were established. The total number of miles and the average miles per rider. Over 500 chapters participated and the race was tight but when the smoke cleared, our very own Orange Coast chapter stood tall, having recorded over 1.6 million miles. In a very close second place, Fort Lauderdale conceded by a mere 40 thousand miles. Between the two chapters there were over 700 registered riders riding over 365 days. It is astounding to think that the difference came down to a mere ½ a mile per day for each chapter member.

The best part was that it was a friendly competition. Fort Lauderdale reached out to us first, and even sent a rider to visit, and we responded in kind. It was a great competition and 2019 shaped up to be a great rematch. We rode like crazy that year and in the end logged over 1.9 million miles. On Jan 1st the smoke cleared and we again stood tall. It was April when I received a call from corporate H.O.G.. Mileage was audited and they had determined that 200 thousand miles should be removed from our totals. Unfortunately we were not given any valid examples where we had incorrectly logged miles or where the riders didn't ride the miles we recorded. Fort Lauderdale was named the official winner in 2019 and we were second place.

Needless to say there was a lot of bitterness towards the competition and in 2020 our chapter decided overwhelmingly that we wouldn't participate in the chapter challenge. Instead we would hold our own individual contest to see which individuals rode the most miles. Then Covid hit, California went through the lockdowns and the chapter challenge faded into the background.

When 2021 arrived we still weren't ready to participate in the National competition. However there was interest in seeing how we would stack up against the top chapters in the nation if we tracked our own mileage. Orange Coast H.O.G. takes mileage seriously and so we use individual accountability, honor and respect to ensure that each rider has accurate totals. Our leaderboard is published regularly and riders can see who is moving up or moving down. In our opinion it is much more accurate than any number of bean counters back in Milwaukee.

Covid had dealt us a blow in numbers. The big chapters that compete for top mileage all have large memberships and they can count on high numbers to make up for lower miles per rider. We went at them with a vengeance and when the dust settled this year we ended up a respectable 4th place with 1.1 million miles. We were led to that finish by an inspiring year from John Russell. He led the overall individual riders with 41,321 miles. Led by John we saw what we could do and the spark to compete again was rekindled. It is hard to tell what corporate admin types will do with any marketing competition, like the chapter challenge. However we are recording every mile and will stand proudly behind our results. At the end of the year we hope once again to be among the elite chapters of the nation.


Our Holiday Party ~ A Three-Day Event!

Our most recent trip to Laughlin was a multi-day trip. Our Winter Solstice/Salvation Mountain Long Range Ride

The morning started off with meeting at the Sendero marketplace by Starbucks, off Ortega Hwy. Kick stands up at 5:50 AM. Yes, that's correct 5:50 AM. Only the hard-core dedicated "crazy" bikers show up at this time, because it was dark and COLD! It would have been very tempting to just stay in bed where it's warm and cozy and sleep in, but you'd have missed out on the rewarding view of watching the sun make its very first peek into the morning sky on a clear, crisp beautiful day! From that vantage point the views are stunning.

So, we were definitely off for a very cold start of the morning...but an amazing 526 mile journey. One of the things you will see in the chapter is that when we meet early, the hard-core bikers show up. A few of them like Robert Govier, are so hard-core that they ride without any heated gear. It is definitely a pleasure to hang out with these hard-core, crazy people that are willing to get



up at 4:something AM to go on a long range ride... even when the temperatures dip down to the 30° mark.

After riding to the top of Ortega, and waiting for the sun to make its debut, we took our picture, hopped on our bikes and we rode 35 miles to the Rainbow Oaks Café, in Rainbow, Ca. It was a cold ride but when we arrived, it was great to have hot coffee and a great, warm breakfast. The food was great and the atmosphere was even better. Rainbow Oaks Cafe has some history behind it. Although it was established in 1946, they had to close down in 2007 because of the Fallbrook fire that swept through and burned down 206 homes and destroyed over 9000 acres. They used some wood from the fire to rebuild their place. Two years later on April 2, 2009, they were able to re-open. It was a pretty spectacular site to see the parking lot full of bikes and cars, and a thriving café. It always amazes me to see the adverse things that happen to people and businesses throughout a lifetime, and how they handle these setbacks. Some may throw in the towel and give up, while others use it as a catalyst to bring about a new success. Rainbow Oaks was definitely the latter of the two.

One of the things I enjoy most about riding with the HOG chapter is that we don't just go on rides, we ride through life. Many of the places we visit, although we may not always know, have tons of history behind them. The setbacks, the stories, the successes, and the testimonies of overcoming obstacles, is ever present in the areas we ride through.

After breakfast, we said our goodbyes to those who would not be travelling on with us, and headed to our next destination, Salvation Mountain in the Sonoran Desert, Imperial County.



Salvation Mountain

Moving along on the journey, our next major stop was at Salvation Mountain, in Slab City. Slab city is a transient and retiree community where people live "off the grid". If you haven't been there, you definitely need to go see the area. This place definitely has some history and is definitely out there as one of the craziest sites and areas to visit.

Salvation Mountain is a big, man-made hill that has Christian artwork and sayings all over the place. The artwork on the mountain is made of adobe bricks. You will also see old tires, windows, automobile parts, and other crazy things incorporated into the design. There is over 100,000 gallons of paint on the mountain and it needs to be repainted all the time because of the harsh desert climate. There are numerous murals and areas painted with Christian sayings and Bible verses. The philosophy of the mountain was built around the sinner's prayer.





In 1984, a local resident Leonard Knight decided to leave a small monument out of concrete and paint. Over the next five years, the project grew.

This was said about Leonard Knight:

"A visionary ... Leonard worked beyond our concept of time, slowly and methodically without ever wandering from his path. His sole purpose in this endeavor was to spread the message that 'God is Love'. He shared this with everyone who came to the mountain ..."

Although Leonard passed away in 2014, his work is now managed by the nine individuals that sit on the non-profit board.

In Slab City, you will also see many abandoned, and some occupied, trailer homes, tents, and miscellaneous man-made structures around the area. The surrounding areas definitely are "out there" and kind of have the feeling of the zombie apocalypse. Yes, the area is pretty crazy, you gotta see it to believe it. I definitely wouldn't want to be there at nighttime but it is a sight to see in the daytime. Next stop, Glamis!

Glamis - Imperial Sand Dunes Recreation Area

Glamis is one of the largest off-highway vehicle recreation areas for sand dunes in the US. It is quite a breathtaking area. As far as you can see in all directions, it is solid sand dunes. Although I took many photos of the area, the photos do not begin to capture the breathtaking magnificence of the sand dunes. Although I was itching to ride up and down these magnificent dunes, I quickly realized that my 2021 street glide would not make it far. I guess I'll come back later with the right bike.



I am always amazed with the areas we visit. It is easy to forget that California is a vast and beautiful place, and there are actually places outside of Orange County that make it look like you're in another state, or even country. Glamis feels like you're in the Sahara Desert, with rolling sand dunes as far as the eye can see.

Heading Back Home-

Overall, the day was fun-filled with plenty of excitement and beautiful rides. We gassed up and started heading for home. In all, the ride was 13 1/2 hours from start to finish, with four gas stops and closing off the day at 526 miles. Although this seems like a long day, it was definitely a day to be remembered. The miles, the history, the stories, and the friendships developed, will be remembered forever.

If you're reading this and you're one of the "normal" people that rides "normal" miles, I have a challenge for you. You might just want to get out of the house before the sun rises, and take the trip of your lifetime with us crazy Long Range Riders. You won't regret it!

We heard lots of stories in which other chapters had differing issues, and a lot of these chapters were not doing so well. We got to witness firsthand, comparing ours to some others out there, how great of a chapter we have! We have it good! When it came time to talk through some of the difficulties the chapters were having, we just listened and felt very lucky. For example, the topic of Road Captains came up, whether or not they were in support of them, either because they didn't have enough members to support it, or they are too rigid in their rules. We thankfully have a great cadre of Road Captains that make navigating 40+ bikes (on an average ride) safe and efficient. Another topic was how we, as a chapter, are "perceived", which comes across in how we treat each other. And again I think we are doing pretty well on that point, as is demonstrated by the camaraderie and laughter shared over meals and at our stops.

Positive public perception is also affected by outreach to the community like our IWAR ride. Our chapter has always had a charitable side to it, with our support of fundraisers and toy drives, and our rides and events done on behalf of, and to raise awareness of, the Warrior Foundation. A lot of the rides we do have a philanthropic side to them. We ride to give back.

The most important factor for success is relationships, especially with our dealership. We really only can exist because of them. They support us in servicing our bikes, providing parts to enhance them, and when ready, upgrading to a new model. And it is a two-way street. Our chapter is a rolling advertisement for our dealership. As Brian pointed out, no other motorcycle has the level of solidarity that we enjoy with Harley. For that to continue, it is important that we build trust and rapport with Orange County Harley-Davidson, so they see our value to them. Again, we are lucky in that regard. We have a great relationship with our dealer!

Orange Coast HOG's success was validated by the 'solutions' to challenges that came up in the discussion groups. Our leadership is already implementing the ideas and suggestions that were being proposed. The strength of our Chapter's leadership is our willingness to adapt and reassess our decisions as a group, so that we can do it better going forward. But from what we could see at this training, we are already on the right path.

After a long day of meetings and discussion group sessions, we were ready to explore the town, so we rode to the huge Scottsdale Harley-Davidson dealership/experience. It was too late to get a haircut, tattoo or get married (yes, they have all those services available!), but we did enjoy the sound system installed on the "Audio Room" bike! And of course we bought some souvenirs! Getting hungry, we rode to old Scottsdale but couldn't get dinner without a reservation. So we rode back to the hotel and walked to a gastropub across the freeway, where we ate a great meal and got to celebrate Mo's birthday. We ended the evening by the hot tub with more talking and laughter, feeling very lucky that we really enjoy one another's company. Mo got a new nickname—Dachshund, and we gave him a gift to commemorate the weekend (you can ask him how that came about!)

Our ride home took in some new scenery. We backtracked through Gila Bend. In Yuma, Jan and I both saw alien space ships, amongst some metal statues, but even weirder was a 45-minute wait for Denny's! So we rode a little further to Cracker Barrel. We were the table everyone wanted to sit at, as we enjoyed each other's company.

The weekend was a reminder that good leadership makes good decisions, that build a solid foundation. And that foundation is what we have been building on for the past 2 ½ decades, and it is also strong enough to change for the better as we're always learning. Always keeping it fun to ride!
